The teachers were recognized at the Golden Apple Foundation board meeting, Dec. 12, 2017. This total is twice the amount distributed in 2016. Projects selected focused on reading, communication and STEM skills, knowledge retention, student engagement and parental involvement. All projects feature creative ways to encourage student achievement.

Golden Apple Foundation opened the application process to enhance the learning of PreK – 12th grade students throughout Winnebago and Boone counties for projects that would go unfunded by school budgets. Previously, the application process was open to just six class levels (PreK-5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup>- 12<sup>th</sup> grades in alternating years). Since its inception, Golden Apple Foundation has provided funding to 241 educators for 208 projects totaling more than \$124,000. Recipients will be recognized at the 22<sup>st</sup> Annual Golden Apple Banquet Friday, April 27, 2018, at Giovanni's Restaurant and Convention Center.
